A day in Hockley will likely mean that you will eat or drink in a place in which you've never been to, or even heard of before - but don't let the unfamiliar scare you. The nature of Hockley means that you are always exploring new things and your curiosity will always be sparked.

Jamcafe

Jamcafe is a well-known establishment in Nottingham. It is a live music venue, a bar, and a café all rolled into one. With a 'no big brands' motto, Jamcafe opts to champion small musicians and labels rather than sticking to the mainstream. During the day Jamcafe is the perfect place to enjoy a coffee whilst watching the world go by, however, it is in the evening when Jamcafe really comes alive: DJ sets, comedy nights and poetry slams – Jamcafe has it all.

Activities in Hockley

Hockley is located in the Creative Quarter of Nottingham, it is no surprise then that this is where you will find the city's most notable cinema, the Broadway, and perhaps the most famous independent record store in the world, Rough Trade. In the summer months, Hockley is also home to Nottingham's Pride Festival and the city's own music festival, the Hockley Hustle. So if you have time to spend in between your visits to the various food and drink establishments then be sure to check out the following places.

Peggy's Skylight

Peggy's Skylight is a jazz and soul music venue located in one of Hockley's quieter streets. Each night (Thursday – Sunday), Peggy's Skylight hosts a different artist from the jazz, blues and soul world. Within just three years of operation, Peggy's Skylight has already been named the Jazz Venue of the Year by the UK Parliamentary Jazz Awards.

Broadway Cinema

Just a stones throw away from the Paragon Law offices, is the notable Broadway Cinema. The name is right to make you think that this is just a cinema, but it's not 'just' a cinema: it's a key part of Nottingham's history and a key piece of its future. For instance, back in 1993 the Broadway established Nottingham as a movie 'Mecca' when it hosted the UK's premiere of Pulp Fiction. Similarly, in 2019 the Broadway underwent a redesign which saw local legend, Paul Smith, create the interiors of the cinema. In the true Hockley-way, the Broadway continues to shine a light on films and people from all around the world: a regular week at the Broadway can see the latest blockbuster play alongside a Spanish indie film.

Sneinton

Sneinton is located just minutes away from Hockley, and together with the Lace Market and Hockley it creates Nottingham's 'Creative Quarter'. Sneinton is best known for its weekly markets which see a range of independent stalls and sellers flock to the market square. However, Sneinton is currently undergoing a redevelopment which, it is hoped, will allow the area to compete with the reputation of neighbouring areas like Hockley.

Sneinton's proximity to the city centre can mean that it often goes overlooked but since 2014 the area has been going through a period of regeneration. Whilst the area is still in a period of investment and redevelopment it is certainly worth a visit, even if it is a fleeting one. To locals, Sneinton is best known for its market: every Saturday

independent stall holders show up to the square to sell a range of quirky and eclectic goods. This is a tradition which can date back to the 19th century and is only set to continue as redevelopment plans firmly place Sneinton's market in the centre. However, in addition to its markets Sneinton is becoming home to an increasing number of independent shops.

One of Sneinton's most popular jaunts is independent coffee shop 'Blend' which serves up a range of delicious drinks, sandwiches, and slices of cake. Blend's central location makes it the perfect place to watch the world go by whilst enjoying one of its artisan coffees. Another popular Sneinton establishment is Murat, Murat is unmissable: it's a big green warehouse which you can see a mile off. Murat is an international supermarket where you can grab ingredients from countries such as Poland, Turkey, India and Pakistan. Not only is Murat a staple place to grab ingredients from but it has provided many jobs for the BAME and migrant community. Murat is more than just a shop: it's a key part of Sneinton life.

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
